DAVID WIPPMAN is a recognized authority in international law. He has taught public international law, international criminal law, international human rights, and ethnic conflict. In 1998–99, he served as a director in the National Security Council's Office of Multilateral and Humanitarian Affairs, working on the International Criminal Court, economic sanctions, war crimes issues, and U.N. political issues. He has been a visiting scholar at the University of Ulster, Northern Ireland. Recent publications include the co-authored *International Law, Norms, Actors, Process: A Problem-Oriented Approach* and *Can Might Make Rights? Building the Rule of Law After Military Interventions*.
