


The John Dewey Lecture in the Philosophy of Law is named in honor of John Dewey, American philosopher, educator, and scholar. A proponent of legal realism, Dewey's philosophy of pragmatism related his conception of a moral life to a variety of contemporary social, economic, and political issues. Dewey lived from 1859 to 1952 and spent one year as a professor of philosophy at the University of Minnesota. The John Dewey lecture is funded by a grant from the John Dewey Foundation and is sponsored by the University of Minnesota Law School to provide a forum for significant scholarly contributions to the development of jurisprudence.

### THE CURRENT STATE OF INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL JUSTICE

**JUSTICE RICHARD J. GOLDSTONE** served as a judge in South Africa for 23 years, the last nine (1994-2003) as a Justice of the Constitutional Court. He was the first chief prosecutor of the U.N. International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia and Rwanda (1994-96); a member of the U.N.-appointed committee chaired by Paul Volcker in 2004 to investigate allegations regarding the Iraqi Oil for Food program; and led the U.N. Fact Finding Mission on Gaza in 2009. Since retiring from the bench, he has been a visiting professor at several U.S. universities and law schools, currently Yale University. In 2009, he received the MacArthur Award for International Justice for his contributions and commitment to human rights and justice worldwide. He is a foreign member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and an honorary member of the New York Bar Association, Bencher of the Inner Temple in London, and Fellow of St. John's College in Cambridge. In this lecture he considers the work of the international criminal courts for the former Yugoslavia, Rwanda, and Lebanon, which are in their closing stages, and the future of international criminal justice.
