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THOMAS F. COTTER'S principal teaching and research interests are domestic and international intellectual property law, unfair competition, antitrust, and law and economics. In July 2007, he was awarded the two-year Solly Robins Distinguished Research Fellowship.

Professor Cotter joined the Law School faculty in 2006. In 2005-06, he was a professor at Washington and Lee University School of Law. From 1994-2005, he taught at the University of Florida College of Law, where he held a University of Florida Research Foundation professorship and directed the school's Intellectual Property Law Program. He practiced law at Cravath, Swaine & Moore in New York City (1988-90) and at Jenner & Block in Chicago (1990-94).

Professor Cotter received his B.S. and M.S. degrees in economics from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and his J.D., in 1987, from the University of Wisconsin Law School. He has authored or coauthored more than 30 scholarly publications, including *Intellectual Property: Economic and Legal Dimensions of Rights and Remedies* (with Roger D. Blair), published by Cambridge University Press in 2005.
